- A thesis should be broad enough to include all the subtopics, information, or arguments in the essay. However, it should be narrow enough to allow you to deal with it thoroughly in the space available.
- Avoid using extreme terms such as <u>all</u>, <u>never</u>, and <u>always</u> in a thesis, unless you are sure you can back up what you are saying.

EXAMPLE: **Too broad:** All stress research today owes its existence to the work of Hans Selye.

(It would be almost impossible to prove such a general

statement.)

Too narrow: Hans Selye was the first to coin the term "stress" in

relation to human beings.

(This is an interesting fact, but it does not leave much room for

the writer to expand upon it.)
